Pastoral Piece

Grieving Queen Elizabeth II.

Many I've been in conversation with in the last few days have expressed surprise at the depth of their grief over the death of the Queen. They have been caught unawares, as I have, at the sudden rising of tears or a lump in the throat. This seems surprising especially if we've perhaps only ever seen her majesty via the media, or only caught a fleeting glimpse of her, maybe much earlier in life. One explanation, which I think may well be true, is that she has been the nations' mother or grandmother figure. We have taken her into our hearts. Another helpful explanation is that the Queen's death has sparked off our own more personal griefs – the loss of our own mother, or close loved ones. There is a resonance in our feelings, reawakening a grief which we thought had perhaps subsided, been resolved. One thought I've not heard expressed but which has occurred to me, is that the Queen has always been there for most of us for our whole lives. Her presence has been obvious on TV for so many state occasions as well as reports of visits to communities and charities across the nation and world. She addressed us at Christmas. Her image is on our everyday transactions - on banknotes, coins and stamps. So why is it a surprise that she is also present in our grief? Perhaps because we did not anticipate that. But if, like any other loved one, we grieve when someone who has been significant for us when they die, then the same is true of the Queen. Just like them, we transfer the Queen's living presence from life into the realm of our grieving – our keenly felt awareness of her absence. As she herself has so wisely said, "Grief is the price we pay for love."

Something else which I've noticed is the prevalence of the sentiment "rest in peace" when leaving messages for the Queen. That is good and is an expression of acceptance that the Queen has died. She has worked hard all her long life and reign, keeping her promise to serve her people. She deserves a rest! But I've also noticed the absence of what follows "RIP" for Christians: RIG – rise in glory. For Christians resurrection is the ultimate hope, the proper response to death. So perhaps we can use this time as an opportunity to ask ourselves whether we really believe that RIG follows RIP. We need to grieve, and the official period of mourning allows us as a nation the space to register our loss. But just as in one breath we say "The Queen is dead! Long live the King!", as Christians we also say of her and others whom we love: "May she/he rest in peace and rise in glory!

NEW – energy bill relief scheme for churches

This week, the government announced a package of support to help with rising energy bills this winter. Under the Energy Bill Relief Scheme wholesale prices are expected to be fixed for all non-domestic energy customers, including churches.

Energy prices will be capped at £211 per MWh for electricity and £75 per MWh for gas for six months from 1 October 2022 to 31 March 2023. Churches do not need to contact their suppliers or apply to the government scheme; the support will automatically be applied to bills.

The six church newsletter editors and all the attendees of the SEP Council have received a document showing a draft of what future ministry in the partnership could look like. Would all congregations please look at this and then make your opinions known to the church council. If you can make it, please come along to the SEP Church (all six of them) meeting to discuss the future of our ministry in SEP, on Sunday 23rd October at 12:30 at Christ Church in Stantonbury. Thank you to them for offering their church to hold this meeting.

Chairs of each congregation, please could you meet as a Church Council before 23rd October so that your SEC Representatives and Deanery Synod Representatives can bring all the most recent queries and news to the Church Meeting to be held at Christ Church on that day. Thank you.

COVID National church guidance

The guidance is clear that we should continue to offer Holy Communion in both kinds, but it is important that no pressure is placed on individual members of congregation to receive the sacrament if they feel unable to do so.

Thank you, John, for editing and publishing this leaflet so well. I hope it is possible for individual congregational newsletters to be less filled with dates of services and regular occurrences and more news.

News from Diocese of Oxford

'The four bishops have written to all licensed clergy, LLMs and church officers in the diocese to thank them for responding so well in the days following the death of Her Majesty Queen Elizabeth II.'

New Dwelling passage for 2022/3

Each year a Bible passage is selected as a focus for study and sharing what scripture is saying to us. The passage for this year is John 1:1-18.

'In the beginning was the Word, and the Word was with God, and the Word was God. ² He was in the beginning with God. 3 All things came into being through him, and without him not one thing came into being. What has come into being 4 in him was life, and the life was the light of all people. ⁵ The light shines in the darkness, and the darkness did not overcome it. ⁶ There was a man sent from God, whose name was John. ⁷ He came as a witness to testify to the light, so that all might believe through him. 8 He himself was not the light, but he came to testify to the light. ⁹ The true light, which enlightens everyone, was coming into the world. ¹⁰ He was in the world, and the world came into being through him; yet the world did not know him. 11 He came to what was his own, and his own people did not accept him. 12 But to all who received him, who believed in his name, he gave power to become children of God, ¹³ who were born, not of blood or of the will of the flesh or of the will of man, but of God. ¹⁴ And the Word became flesh and lived among us, and we have seen his glory, the glory as of a father's only son, full of grace and truth. 15 (John testified to him and cried out, 'This was he of whom I said, "He who comes after me ranks ahead of me because he was before me.") ¹⁶ From his fullness we have all received, grace upon grace. ¹⁷ The law indeed was given through Moses; grace and truth came through Jesus Christ. 18 No one has ever seen God. It is God the only Son, who is close to the Father's heart, who has made him known.'

Free spectacular to celebrate Milton Keynes' city status

A free festival is being held in the heart of Milton Keynes this October, culminating in a spectacular public event on 8 October to celebrate Milton Keynes becoming a city. The City of Codes & Light Festival organised by Milton Keynes Islamic Arts and Culture (MKIAC) in partnership with local cultural institutions including Milton Keynes City Council, will present a memorable festival finale from 6pm on Saturday 8th October.

Starting Tuesday 4th October, the wider festival promises to deliver a captivating blend of media, music and movement, with special light shows organised by award-winning visual projection companies at venues across MK including Bletchley Park. The festival leads up to the grand finale, which includes:

- Live music and performances on stage at Station Square with a laser show providing the backdrop to thrilling music from the Royal Philharmonic Orchestra and the Ibiza Orchestra.
- A 'digital light parade' combining high-impact drumming with kaleidoscopic lighting design, where artists from two of the UK's most in-demand street theatre companies, Cirque Bijou and Worldbeaters, will lead spectators on a spellbinding parade starting at Church of Christ the Cornerstone (where people can first enjoy a projection by Limbic Cinema called 'Radiance') and ending at the Station Square main stage for the rest of the evening's entertainment.

Anouar Kassim MBE, Founder and Director of MKIAC said, "Thanks to the Arts Council England and Milton Keynes Council, we can celebrate MK's innovation and technological history as well as our newly acquired city status. This festival brings diverse communities together, so we are incredibly proud to have the responsibility of celebrating such a fantastic achievement. We cannot wait to welcome everyone to the multiple exciting events taking place throughout the first week of October and we would like to encourage all members of the community to join us. It promises to be a celebration like no other."

Leader of Milton Keynes Council, Cllr Pete Marland, said, "In our bid for city status presented to Queen Elizabeth II, we described Milton Keynes as a 'mosaic of communities united by a love of where we live'. This spectacular parade and light show will be an opportunity for everyone to unite in celebration of our becoming a city, and to enjoy a brilliant evening of free music and entertainment. The MKIAC have staged fantastic events in previous years, and we are working with them to create an even bigger festival finale as a special way to remember this historic year." There will be

- an environmental and wellbeing discussion at Milton Keynes College
- An illuminating light projection at Bletchley Park
- A concert at Church of Christ the Cornerstone by Aashiq Al-Rasul, a music ensemble delivering the fundamentals of tolerance and harmony through the universal language of rhythm and melody.
