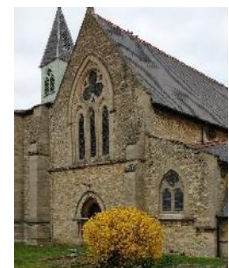

## **External Ecumenical News**

### **News from Diocese of Oxford**

On Thursday 6 April 2023, four people from the Diocese of Oxford were honoured with Royal Maundy gifts of specially minted coins by The King, in the Royal Maundy Service at York Minster. The number of Recipients is equal to the Monarch's age and this year 74 men and 74 women were chosen. Each recipient is gifted two small leather purses, one white holding coins to the value in pence of the Monarch's age and one red holding a special £5 and a special 50p. The tradition is one of the oldest of royal life dating back to at least 600AD, and in this country, the first record of the monarch doing so is in 1213. Now a symbolic ceremony, the tradition began with kings and queens giving money to those in need and washing the feet of their poorer subjects, as Jesus washed the feet of the disciples at the Last Supper.

The four recipients in the Diocese of Oxford are honoured for their quiet and steadfast dedicated Christian service to our local communities and churches.

Penny Ginger has been a dedicated volunteer in her community, local church and [Christ Church Cathedral](#). Penny spent many years as the Aston Clinton Parish Church Council Secretary, a Church Warden, and volunteering with the Women's Institute and the Horticultural Society. Since 2011, she has been Head Steward and Chair of the Stewards' Committee and Head Guide and Chair of the Guides' Committee at Christ Church Cathedral.

Anthony Houghton-Brown is a Parish Church Council member and was a Churchwarden for many years at his village church in Buckinghamshire. Anthony has raised over £30,000 for Parkinson's Disease research and he remains devoted to faith and the church.

Gloria Richards has been committed to the Christian faith and serving the Lord from a young age. She recently celebrated her 85<sup>th</sup> birthday and continues her support of the Church Army as a Mission Community member. Her 'prayer life of intercession for others is regular, committed and expectant'. at Berinsfield Church. She facilitates a monthly prayer link with the 'Burning Bush' Project in the Diocese of Kimberly and Kuruman, a Mission Partner of the Diocese of Oxford.

David Shaw's life-long Christian faith has seen him committed to fervently serving the local church in each place he has lived. At 88, David is still an active member of a church in Chipping Norton where three of his children and their families also attend, a legacy that is a witness to David's devotion to following God's call. Local people say that his "extraordinary faith sets a wonderful example to all of us who are privileged to meet him."

The Diocese of Oxford has launched a brand-new contemplation and reflection resource for families with young children to enjoy exploring and journeying together in faith.

Space Makers for Families is designed to equip caregivers, parents, grandparents and godparents with tools to nurture their own everyday faith and spiritual journey, alongside the children and family members with whom they live.

Recognising that family life is very full, the resource provides seven practices, one for each day of the week, that can be done anytime and to fit into the busyness of everyday life. The practices range from a few mins to 15 minutes and are suitable for children from preschool to age 11. Each practice provides the opportunity for families to explore different elements of an everyday faith.

Reflecting on her hopes for the resource, **Yvonne Morris, Space Makers author, Discipleship Enabler and Children and Family's Ministry Advisor in the Diocese of Oxford**, said:

"I'm excited to be able to offer this resource tailored for families and children to help them to encounter more of God, and to live more deeply and less anxiously as they journey together in the Christian faith.

"It is an invitation to parents, grandparents, caregivers to do something with and for themselves, their children, and their household. The hope is that in time these practices will become a habit for each family member, as part of who they are, as they seek to serve God in their everyday lives."

**The Rt Revd Dr Steven Croft, Bishop of Oxford**, said: "I'm delighted that we have expanded the Space Makers series to deliver this new resource for families to grow in faith in Christ together in a way that fosters those important everyday faith habits of self-reflection and contemplation. "It is my hope that this resource will create spaces for families to experience God's love and presence in their lives together, as parents and caregivers guide their children to flourish on the pathways of life and faith."

Space Makers for Families is designed in an easily accessible way for children – even the youngest – to take part, share their reflections, lead and guide the practices. Each pack contains a booklet with detailed practice exercises and suggested scripts, a

tabletop booklet with images and practice prompts, and a Moment Maker template for children to create.

## News from The United Reformed Church

### Coronation Day: URC prays for King and Queen

In a typically British piece of ritual, much pomp and ceremony will take place to anoint and crown someone to a purely symbolic office with no real independent power. Such authority that the King has can only be exercised with the advice, and consent, of the government. Such guidance and advice that the King may give to ministers is necessarily private and, of course, can easily be ignored.

The URC stands in a tradition of British Christianity which was, at best, rather ambivalent about the monarchy.

Our spiritual ancestors welcomed the Commonwealth in the Civil War era and argued, after all, for the execution of Charles I! Passages in the Old Testament which showed God warning against the Jewish people establishing a monarchy were used as guidance in the Civil War era and the identification of the monarchy with the Church of England added another layer of complexity to our history.

Thankfully, the turmoil of those years is long behind us and, in a much more secular age, differences between Christian denominations are less acute. The URC, and its antecedents, were – and are – eager to play a key part in the civic life of our nations; each year we continue a long tradition of sending an Address To The Throne from our General Assembly where we comment on the issues of the day, presumably in the hope that His Majesty will send those comments on to various government departments. In our contemporary society, and certainly within our congregations, there are a variety of views on the monarchy, yet we can unite in wishing Their Majesties The King and Queen well today. We pray that they will feel God’s presence as they are anointed and throughout His Majesty’s reign. We hope that they will use their office well and use their voices at the centre for those on the margins of our bitterly divided society. We pray that His Majesty The King reminds



us of the importance of spirituality and religion in the lives of our nations. Above all, the URC commends their Majesties, The King and Queen, to God's care and protection.

Eternal God,  
You order and govern our world and all that is therein,  
bless, we pray, Charles and Camilla today  
as they are crowned and anointed,  
that amid the pomp and ritual,  
they may feel your loving presence,  
that they may fulfil the roles prescribed for them,

and always reminded of your eternal Kingdom which is to come.

Dear Members of Stantonbury Partnership,

### Sabbatical Plans

Many of you know that I am taking a final sabbatical of my active ministry from 1<sup>st</sup> May to 31<sup>st</sup> July 2023. In conversation with some individuals I realised that it might be helpful if I wrote to all of you, giving you an idea what is planned.

First, I am grateful to those who are kindly providing cover in different ways whilst I'm away. Several ministers, local and from further afield, are taking Sunday services. At Bradwell Susan Jackson will be covering funerals, and Esther Squire baptisms. Steve Barnes has agreed to provide emergency advice should it be needed. At St James Helen Rouse is covering funerals, Duncan Barnes baptisms, and together with Mary Cotes, these three 'in-house' ministers will be able to respond to unexpected matters. In both churches we have experienced churchwardens and other lay leaders perfectly capable of holding matters or making decisions should they be needed. Nicola Martyn-Beck is also a back-up for all concerns that can't be dealt with at congregational level.

My sabbatical is going to be spent exploring possible forms of ministry after I leave full-time active ministry beyond autumn 2024. Some people have asked whether I'm going to write another book! I don't intend to do that – but I may well write some reflections of my 38 years' experience of ordained ministry, the last 20 years of it spent in the Stantonbury Partnership. I do plan to read plenty of other people's books, however!

Apart from just taking some time to rest and recuperate, I'm going to be exploring two aspects of chaplaincy ministry in the (Anglican) Diocese in Europe. During May and June, Jeanette and I will be staying at our apartment in Kuşadası, on Turkey's Aegean coast (near the biblical Ephesus). There is a local Anglican chaplaincy serving the many ex-pats who've settled there. In retirement we intend spending extended periods there, and I may be able to help the full-time chaplain from time to time.

For ten days in the middle of July I'm staying in Santiago de Compostela, Spain. There are many English-speaking pilgrims who walk one of the many "caminos" (ways). During the main season Anglican ministers do short periods of duty there, offering a ministry of welcome to pilgrims, taking English services, meeting and sharing with individuals, helping them take stock of what can be a life-changing experience. I'm going to try it out with a view to offering perhaps an annual "tour of duty" when I'm retired.

May I encourage you to think of my period of absence as also your "sabbatical" during which you perhaps review your commitment to and involvement with our church life here? In particular, I'm encouraging those who I most closely work with, to observe areas where my absence highlights aspects of church life where advice or support is especially needed. We can then examine how any unexpected gaps can be filled or provided for when I am permanently no longer in post.
