Revd. Dr. Paul Smith has now resigned as Team Rector, so the advert for a Team Rector is in the Church Times, The Oxford Diocese website and Stantonbury Ecumenical Partnership website now. The Section 11 meeting took place at the PCC meeting, which was Chaired by David Preston, Chair of Trustees.

### Appointment of new Baptist Minister

Several members of the congregation will have met Philip, a candidate for the Baptist vacancy, when he visited Milton Keynes in February. He will be coming again, this

time on a more formal basis, for an interview and to 'Preach with a view'.

The interview will take place on Saturday 6<sup>th</sup> April at 2.30pm at Christ Church. The interview panel will represent most of the congregations in the partnership and will have Adrian Prisk, David Preston, Rev David Haseldine, Trudy Hutchings, Helen Rouse and Diana Stammers.

He will preach with a view on Sunday 7<sup>th</sup> April at Christ Church's usual 10.30am service. We have his consent for this to be live streamed and for the recording to remain available afterwards. All members of the partnership are welcome to attend as this will be a Partnership decision and not just an appointment for Christ Church.

A meeting, open to all church members in the Partnership, will be held on Monday 8<sup>th</sup> April at 7.30pm in the hall at Christ Church where on the basis of the interview and the service he has led, which we hope those attending will have seen either in person or online, we will decide whether to choose him and call him to minister to us in Stantonbury.

# News from Diocese of Oxford

A lesson on the birds and the bees helped support environmental charity A Rocha UK, at a children's church group in Great Missenden.

Youngsters met for their regular MAP (Making and Praising) group and made bird boxes and decorated plant pots to be planted with bee-friendly flowers. The terracotta pots were sold to an appreciative congregation, while the bird boxes were out up around the churchyard of St Peter and St Paul's and beyond. "Older members of the congregation worked with the kids to make these bird boxes for robins and bluetits. They had great fun decorating the pots and it was great to give back to A Rocha UK who have supported our Eco Church work with access to resources."

Children were also treated to a closer look at a beehive, thanks to Keith Ray who brought an empty one into church. They are looking forward to a farm visit next month where they hope to meet some spring lambs.

**Oxford Diocesan Synod:** focussing on children, youth and families, met on Saturday Nature at the heart of making and praising Eco church group 9 March. Over 70 members joined together for their first meeting of 2024.

Gathering at Holy Trinity Church in Hazelmere, Jim Tucker was admitted into the Order of St Frideswide. Jim was presented by the Revd Canon Peter Moger, sub-dean of Christ Church Cathedral, Oxford.

The Bishop's address showcased a new film from the diocese that aims to bring the voices of children and young people to the fore. Over half a million children and young

people live in the Diocese of Oxford, but declining numbers of under-20s in attendance at church services paint a stark picture.

Bishop Steven praised the work of the many diocesan youth and children's workers, both lay and ordained, and urged all present to consider what's next. "Every week across the diocese clergy and lay volunteers take assemblies in local schools, church and non-church; local churches host services; children's lives are rebuilt through the patient listening of chaplains. And yet, we know there is so much more we can do..."

Drawing on the wisdom of Matthew 9, Bishop Steven encouraged every member of Synod into a cycle of contemplation, compassion and courage in relation to ministry to children, young people and families, the key topic of a motion and debate occurring later in the meeting.

There were poignant talks on equality, diversity and inclusion. The Revd Katie Tupling, diocesan Disability Advisor, Polly Falconer, UKME Development Enabler, and the Revd Dr Hannah Lewis, Chaplain amongst the Deaf Community, took the mantle in turn to detail their roles and visions for a more Christ-like Church, before opening the floor to questions.

Asked how white, heterosexual, able-bodied men could help, Charnelle encouraged them to use their positions to platform others. "You have roles of authority in which people are willing to hear your voices - use those voices and create opportunities where the lesser heard voices can be heard. Don't listen to the noise – this is the moment in which you're able to show courage."

A recurring theme through the questions was the need for a culture change. A Synod member raised the example of being asked to sit and stand continually through a church service, and how many find that difficult and disempowering. The Revd Hannah Lewis agreed, and urged the room to consider where things are cultural – motions we've got used to – as opposed to embedded in doctrine and necessary to the heart of worship.

#### Looking ahead

"This Synod endorses the need to significantly increase our engagement with children, young people, families and schools building on Disciples Together and to share the good news of Jesus Christ, and calls on every deanery and benefice in 2024 to develop plans and partnerships for growth."



So I leave the Last Word item this month to Rev Dave Haseldine

#### Dear Friends,

Happy Easter to you! Christ who was crucified is risen! **He is risen indeed! Alleluia!** We believe in the goodness of God that we see all over the place: in the natural world; in the Bible; in the person of Jesus; and when we are aware of and see the presence and activity of the Holy Spirit. And we believe: 'all things shall be well'; and in a new heaven and a new earth where there will be no more illness or death and God's love will reign unopposed.

*But* we live with the tension that this Kingdom of God is *coming*, it is not here fully yet, and for too many people it seems a cruel fantasy.

Paul of Tarsus knew of this almost unbearable tension and wrote of it and of how Jesus: knew of it; lived in it; faced it; what it cost him to overcome it; and calls us to live with the same tensions and trust him by following him. In Romans 4:25-5:5, Paul writes:

Jesus was delivered over to death for our sins and was raised to life for our justification. Therefore, since we have been justified through faith, we have peace with God through our Lord Jesus Christ, through whom we have gained access by faith into this grace in which we now stand. And we boast in the hope of the glory of God. Not only so, but we also glory in our sufferings, because we know that suffering produces perseverance; perseverance, character; and character, hope. And hope does not put us to shame, because God's love has been poured out into our hearts through the Holy Spirit, who has been given to us.

Life is a struggle! But we grow when we struggle. Maybe that is the only time and way we grow. I wish it were different, that Jesus could make me grow without it being so costly, without me having to 'die to my self', to the worst that is in me, or the 'me' that most resists Jesus' call to trust him in and above absolutely **everything**.

So there is no short-cut to resurrection by-passing the crucifixion. Jesus says that losing your life is the only way to find new life. And everyone who takes even small steps on this mad way of his grows as perseverance produces character, and character produces hope. I confess that I only take small steps trusting Jesus in this way, but when I do, God's love seeps into my heart. And I take huge encouragement from others who take bigger steps, and it is clear that the Holy Spirit does indeed abundantly pour God's love into their hearts. As we face all the challenges that we do at this time, may we encourage one another in this way and look for the outpouring of God's love through us! Amen!
