

News from Diocese of Oxford

Human flourishing

In presenting a motion to General Synod, Bishop Steven said:

"For a Christian, work is central for human flourishing and not just an economic issue. We were placed in a garden and charged with a God-given task from the very beginning. Work is related intimately to human dignity and purpose."

"Work is more than just the tools we invent or master. Work is more than just a means to earn a wage."

Human creativity

The Bishop of Oxford continued, "The theological value of work faces new and powerful challenges and needs to be articulated afresh in the public square. To give the most current example, data scraped from the World Wide Web often disregards copyright or intellectual property rights, folding individual examples of human craft and creativity so deep inside a black box that proving theft is beyond most individuals."

The Archbishop's amendment committed the Church of England to becoming a signatory on the Rome Call for Al Ethics, and the statement was signed during a meeting of the Primates held in Rome for the first time last week.

Warm Welcome Launch

As the new academic year begins and the weather turns colder, winter isn't far away. For the last two years, The Methodist Church has participated in Warm Welcome and opened up warm spaces to help combat loneliness and isolation in the coldest and darkest months of the year.

This year's campaign will be launched at 6.30pm on Thursday 3rd October together with a new 100% Warm Welcome pledge. Currently, 62% of the UK population live within a 30 minute walk of a Warm Welcome space. However, the ambition is to provide 100% of the population with a Warm Welcome less than 30 minutes from home in the next few years.

David Barclay, Warm Welcome Campaign Director, says of the launch event, "It's a collective display of support and encouragement for local organisations and volunteers who might want to offer a Warm Welcome this winter. The purpose of getting together online is ultimately to grow the movement by enlarging the number of spaces that are registered with us...and the opportunities for partners to work collaboratively. We will increase the impact, strength and diversity of Warm Welcome by ensuring everyone has access and feels connected back into their community."

The young people enjoyed activities such as paddleboarding, orienteering and kayaking whilst also making time for Bible study and creative prayer.

The day ended with the East Midlands CYDO, Richard Knott, leading the group through a time of worship before they all tucked into a BBQ together.



One of the young people commented: "I was worried knowing it would be a nine-hour day, but the time flew past. It was an awesome day." while another asked "when can we do it again?"

Eco tip for September

Recycling

As you probably know you can use MK Council's website to check how to recycle various items. For those items that the council can't take you can check a website called www.recyclenow.com where there is advice on recycling practically anything!

Freecycle is a global network of local groups where people can give and get things for free reducing waste and building community. www.freecycle.org

Otherwise, locally, as well as recycling at supermarkets and charity shops there are other local options including the Re-use Community project, Willen Hospice warehouse and Age Concern warehouse all of which are situated close to each other at Burners Lane, Kiln Farm and take all manner of household goods, books, furniture etc.

Dunelm Mills have paired up with the British Heart Foundation and Clearabee to recycle mattresses and furniture and also have a drop off point for their Take Back Textile scheme. Curry's will take back electrical appliances/tech items.

Charity Recycling based at 25, Cantle Avenue, Downs Barn, take smaller items such as cheese wrappers and toothbrushes which are converted into charity donations. There is also a drop off point at Great Linford Parish Council offices. Check their website as items they take can vary from time to time. www.facebook.com/recyclemk

Letter from Dave Haseldine October 2024

Dear friends.

We are now seriously into autumn and, weather-wise, clinging on to hopes of some time(s) of an "Indian summer". (I am not sure if the people who are most expert, or probably more accurately, who are least ignorant, of the planet's phenomenally complex weather and climate systems reckon if the changing global climate patterns might make Indian summers more likely, or less, or more varied.) But we are heading away from the relative warmth of summer, and throughout human history, in colder, wetter, and darker seasons, people have created reasons to celebrate *in* them, and indeed to celebrate *them*. Thus making a virtue out of their necessity.

"Making a virtue out of a necessity" is an interesting phrase! Do you read it positively or negatively? Well, it is certainly pragmatic, and can help anyone, along with St. Paul, to "give thanks in all circumstances" (1 Thessalonians 5:18). So it also turns out to be potentially quite spiritual. At some point, or on many occasions, everyone will have tough experiences that call us to dig deeply into all that keeps us going, all that keeps us hopeful. That goes for all individuals. That has also been true throughout history for all groups and organisations, including our community, church, nation, and for a whole variety of reasons that is true now both for all of those groups and it is also true now for the whole planet.

We are some decades past the time when doing what we can to be an ecochurch / village / town / city / nation / race is just a nice virtuous optional extra. For some decades this has been a growing necessity. But you would not think so from looking at most political and religious leaders, me included, and at most people and at what we say and do. In addition to all the many other challenges we face, we need to be acting on this one more than anything else.

Turning to a narrower focus, over the summer it has become clear that I am unable to be the fully-functioning, full-time minister needed by the four Churches, Circuit, and Ecumenical Partnership that Sarah and I have the privilege of being part of and have had so since the end of summer 2024. So the plan is from now until next summer for me to offer to you all the best ministry that I can with whatever support I need, and for the Churches, Circuit and Ecumenical Partnership to enter into the Methodist Church's Stationing process and seek to appoint a new Methodist Minister (Presbyter).

That is not Plan A. Far from it. But it is a necessity. Can a virtue be made from that? In other words, can we make any theological sense of that? Or, better, can we see God involved in this somehow? I do hope that we can! And for many reasons! For instance, Jesus' parting words to his followers in Matthew 28 were, "I am with you always to the very end of the age." I.e. whatever happens, our Dad, Jesus the Anointed One, and the Holy Spirit, God, is with us, whatever happens: brilliant, disastrous, challenging, seemingly hopeless, ending, new, unfamiliar, scary.

And God uses the unique gifts and skills that he has freely given to you and to each one of us. And God is able to work for his extra-ordinary reign of grace through every very ordinary and broken human being and organisation. St. Paul also writes, "... for Christ's sake, I delight in weaknesses, in insults, in hardships, in persecutions, in difficulties. For when I am weak, then I am strong." (2 Corinthians 12:10).

Ironically, even when we are strong, our very strengths can get in the way of God, for "God's weakness is greater than our strength" (1 Corinthians 1:25) and "God's ways

(of giving up our life and aims and strengths) are not God's ways" (Isaiah 55:9) so that others (and us) may find them!

So may you, I, we, and others, be embraced by this strange God and Father of our Lord Jesus the Christ. May we embrace this Strange God, and (to quote and alter Rowand Williams), may we have eyes to see what this Strange God is doing, and whatever it is, however strange it is, may we join in. Amen?
