Pastoral letter from Revd. Canon Chi

1st January 2025

Dear Sisters and Brothers in Christ,

St Mary Magdalene Willen: Hooke Heritage Project This Project aims to:

- Preserve the Grade 1 listed Willen Church
- Provide discreet toilet facilities and improve accessibility
- Increase space on the Church site for education, spiritual learning and secular activities
- Provide interpretation and learning from its polymath architect, Robert Hooke

The Feasibility part of the Project has been completed to the satisfaction of the Heritage Fund and with the endorsement of the Oxford Diocesan Advisory Committee to proceed to the next stage.

The brief for the new building is yet to be developed. Meanwhile we have been identifying funding sources and their requirements. We are progressing at differing speeds on 3 fronts – construction planning, organisational development, and community learning/ engagement.

Our plans for 2025 include applying to fund significant works on the Church building; drawing up a business plan as this will be required to complete the applications for funding for the new building; arranging for an archaeological survey and arranging a biodiversity survey.

Community engagement will continue with TTTT concerts (starting on March 18th) and a full programme in September for Heritage Open Days.

News from the Methodist Circuit

At the start of the new year Methodists make a distinctive resolution

The covenant service, often celebrated on the first Sunday of the year, is at the heart of Methodists' devotion and discipleship, and their dedication in working for social

justice. In the service the Church joyfully celebrates God's gracious offer that "I will be their God and they shall be my people".

That relationship primarily involves the corporate life of the community of God's people. It is concerned with individuals within that group.

What God offers is a loving relationship. The Covenant is not a contract in which God and human beings agree to provide particular goods and services for each other! It is not something that we have to do to create a relationship with God. God has freely and graciously already made it possible.

Rather, the Covenant is the means of grace by which we accept the relationship and then seek to sustain it. It is therefore not so much about getting in to a relationship with God as it is about staying in it. It is not about acquiring a relationship with God, but living within the loving relationship that God has already offered us.

God's gracious offer to us is therefore simultaneously a challenge. If God is committed to us, are we prepared to accept that as reality and commit ourselves in return to God? Even if we do choose to accept it, how can we manage to live out our commitment adequately, frail and human as we are?

It is in Jesus Christ that we discover the supreme example of what it is to live in relationship with God. The New Testament suggests that as we join the group of those seeking to follow the way of Jesus, we respond to God's challenge with him and begin to share his relationship with God as Father. Within the group of disciples, this leads to his Spirit bubbling up in us as individuals, encouraging and enabling us to live out our side of the relationship (i.e. "writing God's ways on our hearts" as Jeremiah 31 describes the Covenant).

Holocaust Memorial Day (HMD) 2025 will mark the 80th anniversary of the liberation of Auschwitz-Birkenau, the largest Nazi concentration camp, and the 30th anniversary of the genocide in Bosnia. We are running a competition for secondary school students to learn about the 30th anniversary of the genocide in Bosnia and mark it by designing a memorial.

We will award prizes to the top 10 memorial designs and share them on our social media and at the Holocaust Memorial Day 2025 UK Ceremony in January.

All memorial designs must be submitted digitally either as a scan or a high-quality photograph.

Dear Friends,

What was the last pantomime that you went to see? Many people have fond memories of them and families still love going to see (and join in with!) a pantomime, especially just before Christmas or up to a couple of months afterwards.

A few years ago someone re-wrote the Christmas story as pantomime. And indeed, King Herod makes a fantastic pantomime baddie, so everyone can hiss and booo and have a great time. And the nativity story has a happy ending (for Jesus and his family for a time at least) and we can all go home happy and secure. Because in many ways pantomime is deliberately *dis*connected from real life. In pantomime it is abundantly clear who are the good guys and who are the bad guys, and who are the clowns, and who are the innocent ones caught up in the plot, and crucially you know what is going happen, for the story line is pretty much fixed and no-one good is really hurt and no-one is *really* bad, not even the arch-baddy, and they all live happily ever after. In the end, it's for kids, and the adults have fun too. But it's not reality. It's an escape. And that's ok, because it is good to sometimes escape from reality for a while, because reality can be unbearably bruising and hard to face. And so we also need to take some time out to have our batteries recharged so that we can, the next day, face reality again.

But there are risks in treating the Christmas story as if it is a pantomime. Because at its heart, it is the very opposite of a pantomime: it is the reality of God breaking in to the reality of life on Earth so that we can do the same. Real life involves real people, who behave according to who they are. People are *not* cardboard cut-out characters who behave according to the narrow demands of a plot story line. Everyone is a mix of good and bad and often what we do is balanced on a knife-edge and noone knows for sure what they will do, or what others around them will do, or what will happen when we are all interacting together.

History has happened and it has unfolded the way it has. But at the time, as it was happening, no-one knew what would happen next at any point. That was true then, as it is now. Tyrants and self-centred leaders were real, and are real, and there was no guarantee, and there is no guarantee, that standing against them and with and for the little ones they squash, will result in a happy ending any time soon. Too often those befriending the little ones also get squashed. But time and again people in the Bible and today find that God is with them when they are getting squashed. And surprising things happen! A short time after Jesus was born, three foreign spiritual leaders turn up looking for the new King Anointed by God! What an Epiphany! What a surprising revelation! Not my Plan A! Nor King Herod's! And chaos and grief ensue! But God knows what God is doing, and come what may God persists with God's own unbreakable resolution to human beings, especially the most squashed.

So this new year, let's open our eyes to look out for surprises! For when God is with those who are being squashed. And for when God is calling us to make a new year-long resolution to be with them too.
