Welcome to June and with it thoughts of summer events and holidays are very much on our minds. First though we mark Pentecost in the Church - the day of the powerful blessing of the Holy Spirit descending on Jesus' disciples just as he had promised. We should always greet this day with joy and expectation that God's power is here for us, and we should welcome it into our lives.

In June I'm also launching a new home group Bible study meeting for the partnership, alongside Hannah, and we will be first looking at the Sermon on the Mount in Matthew's gospel where Jesus gives this wonderful statement which challenges us all. I hope friends can join in with this, or any of our other organised Home and Church group weekly studies. Full details and timings for these are attached to this edition of the newsletter.

#### 'Post' SEP AGM

We enjoyed the Official Trustees review of the Partnership work over the last year at Christchurch on 22<sup>nd</sup> May, and commissioned friends to continue their great work in our churches for this next year. We prayed God's blessing upon the team even amidst some uncertainties and value all the individual ministries that were affirmed there. The joint Ministers meeting is happening early in June to ensure Sunday coverage especially continues across the Churches in this next quarter through August.

#### Joint SEP Partnership Service

Our next Joint 5<sup>th</sup> Sunday Partnership service together will be in Christchurch at the end of the month. All will be welcome to join us there. It will be a more informal service this time, not including Communion, looking to celebrate our unity and diversity creatively as we worship together and affirm one another.

#### Mission, Evangelism, Discipleship (MED) Group

We have held the second meeting of the Mission, Evangelism and Discipleship (MED) Group in May, with some great input, thought and prayer for the growth of our work together. The full notes for this session are below and I hope bring food for thought to everyone. The next meeting is scheduled for 14<sup>th</sup> July both Live at St James and online via zoom. All are very welcome to join in with the group.

#### <u>SEP MED Group - Second meeting notes - 19/05/25</u> <u>'Mission, Evangelism, Discipleship'</u>



Members Present - 7 live and 4 via zoom ...representing 4 of the SEP Churches.

Phil welcomed all those present, and opened with devotions and a reading from Matthew 13

#### ...Phil then opened in prayer.

We began by reviewing next steps from the last meeting, and talked first about advertising and there was a discussion about websites and weekly notices. There is variance in the churches, particularly with no website at all for Cross & Stable but the SEP website directs people, and Paul does a great job making sure up to date service sheets at least are there. The monthly newsletter too is nicely prepared, however perhaps there is 'too much' in it. Some criticism too about advertising even for this meeting, and use of the acronym 'MED' – whole words are better. Comment was made that there are so many different methods of advertising online and actually word of mouth encouragement is always better. Things may well begin to get better because we have a new Administrator starting in June who will provide a more joined up approach.

Community initiatives and outreach. Not so much work has been done in the Parish council drop ins, and we are not really represented anymore at village fetes and carnivals that are put on, with the exception of St James who maintain a stall at the New Bradwell School carnival. Much comment about coffee mornings and drop ins and the welcome we give. The avoidance of 'church huddle' and the warm welcome are paramount - there was an incident at Bradwell where one person came into the coffee morning, but thought it was a church meeting and left immediately. St James have recently begun opening again for drop in on Wednesday mornings. Comment was made that other days of the week need to be considered - 3 of our churches are now open that same morning.

The question was raised about what is happening this summer in these community terms? - this with the thought of doing some 'low impact and organization' items. Make sure they are advertised though, with someone to coordinate it. The Church Pilgrimage idea was mentioned again, and perhaps an SEP wide picnic. Roger Gander will lead his 'Ramble' again this year, date for this TBC.

It was noted that these are things that will perhaps help to unite us as churches, *but are they specific missional ideas to others?* - a suggestion that we could walk between the village centres and 'do something specific in each'. This might be more missional? Support also for good charitable causes and activities locally to join in and promotes our life together also. Soup runs were also popular at one point and helped many people. 'Unity MK' (Homeless project) was mentioned, and we should try to encourage and get involved with that. Comment was made that people get a real sense of community and sharing as they get involved with these sorts of initiatives.

Children and Youth projects - St James are considering ideas for a new group as they have around 10 young people who are engaging. Cross and Stable's family breakfast club has also engaged a younger audience. Comment was made that beyond Sunday morning's this needs to be informal to begin with, and 'on their terms' (...the youth lead it) but with a core group of adults coordinating in leadership. The young people need engagement by the churches and resources from the denominations could be considered. 'Christ the Sower Ecumenical School' (Crownhill) is worth noting and their initiatives may prove helpful. We also mentioned the new initiative from the Ethos team in Stantonbury High, bringing in the young people for a drop in into Christchurch for an after school group. Church representation here was important. It is necessary for any new group to be advertised 'partnership wide', and for any young people wherever it is held. There was mention of 'Open door', which in St James is a cafe style family service run now by congregation members and they have a good lay-led team. St Andrews also have an Open door service, which appears to be simply a more relaxed family orientated service. Messy Church also operates out of St James, with a few good contacts.

Family breakfast Club has become established at Cross & Stable, with great leadership by Rev Sam. It is encouraged as true 'multigenerational worship', where grandparents to children worship together. He has encouraged youth leadership too. It always begins with food and has a shorter family style service to follow. Phil is encouraging something similar and using the same name at Bradwell - in the reverse style - to begin in July. St James observed that this was close to their 'Open door' style.

We talked about discipleship initiatives and Phil particularly introduced the Housegroup sheet and varied options we now have - for any to attend any of the groups. This sheet will be displayed, advertised wider and feature in the next SEP newsletter. Particular reference was made to Phil & Hannah's new group - starting on June 2<sup>nd</sup> at Bradwell. It was noted that there is no Bible study group at Cross & Stable, so good advertising for this there. Phil indicated again that he was hoping to draw in friends who were not attending other groups. He did not anticipate that any groups would have a large influx of people as a result of this new advertising, but there were opportunities for any at different times in the week.

Comment from Individual Churches - It was noted that Christchurch is the only church now operating a Toddlers style group. Theirs is on a Thursday morning. Others have had nothing like this since COVID because of the people needed to set up and host.

Next steps...

- Summer events for all the churches. Roger's Ramble from Christchurch. Partnership picnic or Pilgrimage are simple, but need someone to coordinate them.
- Community Fetes and Carnivals for involvement. 12<sup>th</sup> July for New Bradwell. 5<sup>th</sup> July Music Festival in Great Linford.
- Christchurch have their 50<sup>th</sup> Anniversary lunch on 19<sup>th</sup> July, which follows their coffee and cake morning.
- Advertising generally, working with our new Administrator Helen.
- Identify new people who are leading, hosting and organising in our churches.
- Mission and outreach activities.
- Youth projects and Family breakfast club.
- House groups and discipleship
- This MED group new name!

We closed with a time of prayer - using 'Evening prayer' material from the Northumbria Community, incorporating silent prayer by all.

... This is an important time in the MED Group meetings.

#### Message from Rev Dr Sam Muthuveloe

#### Human extremity is God's opportunity – June 2025

In life we do our best to keep ourselves safe and healthy. Yet events outside our control overtake us and we are left in despair.

The disciples were trying to make a lake crossing in the scriptures and suddenly a great storm enveloped them, and they literally feared for their lives, but Jesus was with them in the boat. When we are assailed by uncertain events in life, be they health, finance, security, friendships or what we considered to be stable institutions, our human response is to fear, panic and feel our world has collapsed around us. This was the experience of the disciples on the lake. This is a natural human response.

As Children of a living God, at a spiritual level, we always have the unfailing God with us. Jesus said, "And remember, I am with you always, to the end of the age." Matt 28:20. "Come unto me, all ye that labour and are heavy laden, and I will give you rest." Matt 11:28. "Casting all your anxieties on him, because he cares for you." 1Pet 5:7.

It is easy to say these Scriptures when life is normal and stable, yet unless we have practiced them and made them real to us, during the calmer times of our lives, amid a whirlwind storm it is difficult to make them meaningful. Special military operations are conducted frequently during peacetimes to ensure their successful execution in actual combat scenarios.

The depth of our spiritual maturity is tested on a regular basis, and yet the outcome for us as Christians, depends not on our spiritual maturity but on the promises of our God. The Psalmist says, "Even though I walk through the valley of the shadow of death, I will fear no evil, for you are with me; your rod and your staff, they comfort me." Ps 23:4.

Through the storms of life, we grow in spiritual maturity for the glory of God, in the service of the people around us. With every calamity, comes an opportunity, to grow in God and to be a blessing to others. At Pentecost we are reminded, the Holy Spirit is given to us, his Church, as a helper for all times. John 14: 16 to 18.

#### St Mary Magdalene Willen: Hooke Heritage Project

Thank you to everybody who completed the St Mary Magdalene Willen questionnaire earlier this year. Your responses have confirmed that the heritage building's lack of

toilets and poor access are presenting barriers to visitors, and that there is support for addressing this. They also shared insight into how a new space with contemporary facilities might serve the congregation and sustain the heritage church. Using this information, an operational business plan has now been drafted which imagines the future and tests the concept of a new space.

Meanwhile, the heritage credential of St Mary's Willen will be further confirmed on Robert Hooke's birthday on 18<sup>th</sup> July when (weather and serviceability permitting) a heritage aeroplane (Avro Lancaster BI PA474 from the Battle of Britain Memorial Flight) will fly over St Mary's in recognition of the impact of Hooke's early scientific experimentation on contemporary aviation. Flypast time will be notified nearer the time.

#### Archdeacon Guy to retire in September



The Ven Guy Elsmore, Archdeacon of Buckingham, will be retiring from his post at the end of September this year. Guy was ordained as a deacon in 1993, and as a priest in 1994, and served the first 23 years of his ministry in and around Liverpool, where he became the area dean for Wavertree and Toxteth and Honorary Canon of Liverpool cathedral in 2014. He joined the Diocese of Oxford in 2016. Guy said: "I am deeply grateful for the opportunities to serve the Kingdom of God which my role has given me. I will never forget the friendship, faith and kindness of the parishes, the

Bucks Area Team and the wider Diocesan family. Working with Bishop Alan over so many years was a huge privilege, and I am holding Bishop Dave in my prayers as he takes up the mantle of Bishop of Buckingham. It has been a joy to be part of the process which led to his selection and to work with him through these first months of his episcopacy. As I move into retirement, I am looking forward to the next stage of life, and to being of continued service locally as a priest with Permission to Officiate.

## News from The United Reformed Church

# The outstanding Christian service of two URC members were honoured by King Charles on Maundy Thursday.

The Revd Louise Gee, an East Midland Synod Pastoral Consultant who also serves as Chaplain and Trustee at Friary Drop In (West Bridgford), and John East, a former Elder from Central URC in Darwen, attended a ceremony in Durham Cathedral for the annual presentation of Maundy Money just before the Easter weekend.

Each year, purses with the special coins are distributed by the Monarch to a selected number of men and women whose ages match the age of the Royal on Maundy Thursday. This year, 76 people received the Maundy Money, to the value of 76p in a white purse. The gift is to mark their years of Christian service in their communities. The tradition dates back to 1210. Also handed out to the recipients was a red purse containing a £5 coin commemorating The Queen Mother and a 50p coin featuring stories of WWII.

Explaining how he felt humbled, John who has served as Chair of DARE (Darwen Asylum Seeker and Refugee Enterprise and held many roles within the community, said: "I was delighted to be nominated to receive Maundy Money. Having the privilege to serve the Christian Church in many roles, it's important to reflect each day on developing that relationship with Jesus and to be able to learn and sustain a living faith."

Louise said 'I accepted these purses with great delight and great pride on behalf of all those I have walked alongside over the years in many churches, in the prison and those who live on the margins – all who have been such a blessing to my ministry for whom I give thanks to our Lord.

#### Key facts

• An estimated 583 billion plastic bottles were produced in 2021. That is 100 billion more than were produced just five years ago.

• In the UK it is estimated that five million tonnes of plastic is used every year, nearly half of which is packaging.

• Every minute, two garbage trucks of plastic are dumped into our oceans. Currently, a total of 8 million metric tons is dumped.

• Over 1 million marine organisms are killed each year due to plastic pollution in the ocean.

How you can help

1) Buy bags and other items, e.g. wipes, that are biodegradable or reuse them whenever possible.

2) Choose fruit and vegetables with paper or less packaging, or take your own bag.

3) Study MK's recycling scheme. You can recycle plastic bottles, food trays, yoghurt and snack pots, cartons and tubs.

4) Share your ideas with your family, friends and members of your church – and work together.
