Pastoral News - July 2025

Dear friends in Christ

'I cry out to God Most High, to God who fulfills his purpose for me' Psalm 57

We are in July, with long days and hot conditions which although welcome always cause concerns about nourishment and sustainability. I've been reminded of my need to be sustained in the strength of God and seek to do what he requires of me, rather than my own preferences. This is a key thought in our churches right now as we continue to face concerns with ongoing ministry cover. We need to seek God's guidance on our priorities and where he is leading us to focus.

There are a number of events and church leadership meetings in July that both round off our summer activities and prepare us for the Autumn term. One of the exciting opportunities right now is the beginnings of a work with young people particularly in Cross & Stable with the success of their Family Breakfast Club service and St James who are launching a new meeting with a group of high school age youth who enjoy attending services. Christchurch is also planning to welcome young people from the adjacent Stantonbury School in the Autumn; partnering with the School's Ethos Team particularly for a weekly after school club starting in September. Let us pray for these initiatives and God's inspiration about how together we relate particularly to this age group.

Ministry Changes

This month we will mark Rev Dave Hasledine's retirement from full time Methodist circuit ministry; a significant part of which for the last 3 years has been within SEP. We have been profoundly blessed by Dave's ministry and encouragement to us, and we will miss his thoughtful and often creative leadership. Our prayers will be with Dave, and his wife Sarah, as together they plan for a future calmer role with continuing health uncertainties. In September we will welcome his full-time replacement in the Circuit, Rev Kofi Tekyi-Ansah.

A much needed boost to the team has also just been announced, as following a successful interview process for the vacant 'House for duty' post, based at Great Linford, Rev Peterson Feital will be joining the team part time in September. Full details of Peterson's welcome and induction will follow and our prayers are with him, and wife Helen and their family, as they plan their move into the Vicarage.

Our prayers also continue over the absent Team Leader post and how matters will be resolved, with continuing thanks for all of our Licensed Ministers and lay leaders for covering services and tasks at the present time.

Joint SEP Partnership Services

We are planning for our next Joint 5th Sunday Partnership service together which will be at St James, New Bradwell, on Sunday 31st August at the usual time of 11.00am. This will be followed by - the SEP led - 'Annual Tree Cathedral Service' for Milton Keynes, which will be held in that very special place on Sunday September 21st at 4.00pm, with live band and creative prayer.

We will also worship together again to mark Advent Sunday 2025 on Sunday 30th November, which will likely be held at Cross & Stable, Downs Barn.

Letter from Rev Dave Haseldine

Loving the Fab 4 (John, Paul, Peter & Judas)

Dear Friends, [Monthly Church Newsletter Article - DH Final]

Big family celebrations don't happen very often, but recently I have had the delight and privilege of two: a Naming Ceremony and a Wedding. Such occasions can be the best chance to "waste time" with family, friends, others, long-standing and new ones. In the midst of these celebrations have been my ongoing health difficulties, needing to retire early, and Sarah and I no longer being able to share with you all the joys and challenges of trying to be like Christ and live by Grace. So those celebrations with the family and the recent times of worship with you have been incredibly precious oases, spaces to slow down, pause and to simply be in, and be thankful of, the presence of others, and of God.

The celebrations have also helped me to pause and think about how we mark the best moments that we share, what words to use, and what does it mean to be the best human beings that we, and others, can be? Usually some of the key people in baptisms, weddings, and funerals, etc., will not be able to say with meaning and integrity all the words and theology used in most traditional Church services. So, I am growing in these convictions:

- (1) That letting God's Spirit shape us to become and live like Jesus more and more *truly is* what it means for anyone to be the best human being living the best way possible (1 John 4:17).
- (2) Some of the short-term consequences and costs of growing in becoming like Jesus and living by his grace, should evoke challenge, humility, fear, hope, passion, and change, in both Jesus' apprentices and others. If not, that probably means that those of us who say we are his followers are getting it very wrong about the character and ways of the Spirit and Kingdom of God.
- (3) That those character and ways are best expressed, first by the way Jesus called his followers to love one another as he did, which was to love not only the best but also the worst of his followers, e.g. "the Fab 4": John (to whom he was closest), Paul (who initially persecuted Christians), Peter (who spoke first and thought later), and Judas (who betrayed Jesus).
- (4) That those character and ways are best expressed, second by Paul in 1 Corinthians 12:31b-13:13 NIV extracts & paraphrased a bit:

Can you speak the most profound and truthful words? Can you fathom all mysteries? Can you know everything about everything? Can you do things that no-one else ever has or will? Even supposing that you can, but you do not have love: What are you? Actually, nothing! And what do you achieve? Actually, nothing!

Do you really want to be the greatest human being that God has given you the gifts to be? Then here is the most excellent way: authentic, extreme, precarious: Love.

Love is patient. Love is kind. It does not envy, it does not boast, it is not proud. It does not dishonour others, it is not self-seeking, it is not easily angered, and even if when it is, it keeps no record of wrongs. Love does not relish what's wrong but rejoices, delights, even dances with whatever turns out to be true.

It protects whenever it must, trusts whenever it can, hopes always, perseveres always. Love never fails...

Out of everything, what really is essential? What is foundational to, and connects with inseparable continuity, everything that there is now, and all that there is to come, and beyond? Ultimately, it is only three things, these three and nothing else: faith, hope, and love. But the greatest of these is? Authentic, extreme, precarious: Love.

So thank you so much for keeping on sharing your love with Sarah and me. And I pray for you, Kofi, and everyone across the MK Circuit and Stantonbury Ecumenical Partnership, that Jesus will keep on filling you afresh with God's love, so that you can keep on emptying yourselves of it, in order to love one another and others, regardless of whether they seem like John, Paul, Peter, or Judas. Amen! |:)ave Haseldine.



News from The United Reformed Church

Churches Together in England welcomes Tessa Henry-Robinson as President for 2025 – 2028



As her term in office as Moderator of the Free Churches Revd Dr Tessa Henry-Robinson, also acts as one of the Presidents of Churches Together in England,

My ecumenical journey began long before I understood the word. As a child in Trinidad and Tobago, I lived the beauty and complexity of the Christian tradition through my family. My father was born in Tobago and raised in the Methodist tradition. My mother was born in Trinidad and raised in a Roman Catholic and Pentecostal

household. I was baptised in the Methodist Church, educated in Roman Catholic and Anglican schools, and worshipped in Pentecostal settings during holidays with my maternal grandparents. My journey continues to unfold as one committed to the hard work of shared mission, mutual respect, and spiritual integrity across denominational lines.

My earliest (formal) ecumenical experience came in the early 2000s while I was a member of Christ Church Bellingham. I was part of a small team tasked with building relationships across five local churches. That experience was not only informative. It was deeply formative. It taught me that unity across Christian traditions is not just an abstract hope. It is a relational task that demands presence, humility, and trust. As I

worshipped, dialogued, and shared life with colleagues from a range of denominational backgrounds, I began to sense the Spirit moving in ways I had not seen before. I witnessed how God works through different liturgies, languages, and leadership models. Some tensions surfaced, of course. But they were not held as obstacles, they were used as invitations and opportunities to grow deeper in grace. Ecumenical work has never been about erasing difference, it is about honouring difference, engaging it with love, and letting it stretch us toward fuller faithfulness.

The <u>United Reformed Church</u> is itself a living sign of ecumenical commitment. Its very formation brought together multiple denominations in pursuit of a more faithful expression of the Church. To be a URC minister is to have been shaped in the context of being reformed and always reforming in a denomination that not only values being reformed and building unity, but was born from "Ecclesia reformata, semper reformanda secundum verbum Dei", "The church reformed, always being reformed according to the Word of God." My ministerial formation has been rooted in the conviction that Christian unity matters—that we can be deeply faithful to our own traditions while also working generously across them.

Eco Tip for July 2025

Why ORGANIC DAIRY deserves a spot in your fridge

When milk comes from an organic farm it's a whole system of care for animals, people and the planet.

So what makes organic different:

Organic farm dairy cows are free range with space to roam leading to lower stress for cows and fewer antibiotics needed.

Cows are fed an organic diet with 60% grass rich forage producing high levels of Omega-3 fatty acids in the milk No fossil-fuel based pesticides and fertilisers leading to 30% more wild plants and animals on organic farms. Soil on organic farms stores more carbon compared to nonorganic.



So next time you shop consider going organic with your dairy.
